HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS

- You register as a non-degree seeking student at the Mount.
- You must attain a final grade of C or better, effective S119.
- You will receive a “NC” (no credits earned) if your grade is lower than a C.
- You will earn a “W” if you withdraw from your course(s) or high school.
- You may be required to take your high school’s final exam, depending on the subject or discipline.
- You are not required by the Mount to take the AP exam.
- You will receive 3-4 credit hours that are transferable.
- Non-refundable payment of \$50 per credit hour.
- Courses taught by MSJ instructors may require additional textbook costs.
